Eagle to be lead applicant on \$500k viticulture grant

EAGLE – Despite personal beliefs against imbibing wine, two Councilmen voted for the City to be the lead applicant for a \$500,000 Rural Community Block Grant to build a research and “custom crush” facility in the Stillwater Technology Park on Highway 44 in Eagle, and a nursery/greenhouse/foundation block facility on Pollard Drive in Star.

Lloyd Mahaffey, an Eagle resident and managing partner of Viticulture, LLC, said, “Idaho doesn’t teach the science of winemaking and we have to look to California and Washington” since there are no nurseries or foundation blocks in the Gem State. He said Washington has a \$4 billion wine industry that supports 60,000 jobs. The grant application, if successful, would see federal funding come through the state to the City. Mahaffey said experienced viticulturist Angie Riff will serve as executive direction of the proposed Idaho Viticulture Research Center in Eagle to be built

The second is a concurrent resolution which would take a lower-key approach. It would require state agencies to report to the state controller on barriers to seamlessly providing data that could be used in the construction of a transparency website down the road.

Hart said he's hoping the resolution will move forward, recognizing that HB 177 faces serious challenges because it would cost the state \$250,000, and very few items with a price tag are being contemplated for passage this year. As a resolution, it would require passage by just the House and Senate (not the governor). The resolution is designed to be a way to make progress on transparency this legislative session.

Leading the way in this process that could become common in Idaho, the City of Eagle earlier this year became the first municipality in Idaho to adopt a transparency resolution to place many financial records on its web site, cityofeagle.org.
